

Topic Information

Year 2 English

READING: word -

read accurately by blending the sounds in words that contain the graphemes taught so far, especially recognising alternative sounds for graphemes;

Comprehension -

Being introduced to non-fiction books that are structured in different ways;

TRANSCRIPTION -

segmenting spoken words into phonemes and representing these by graphemes, spelling many correctly; add suffixes to spell longer words;

<u>WRITING</u>: Grammar, Vocabulary and Punctuation- capital letters, full stops, questions marks, exclamation marks, present and past tense, sentence structure, noun phrases; Composition- writing narratives about personal experiences and those of others (real and fictional), writing about real events, writing poetry, writing for different purposes; make revisions and corrections to their own writing

HANDWRITING -

write capital letters and digits of the correct size, orientation and relationship to one another and to lower case letters

Year 1 English

<u>READING:</u> word - read words with contractions (e.g. I'm, I'll); apply phonic knowledge and skills as the route to decode words **comprehension** - check that the text makes sense to them as they read

TRANSCRIPTION – name the letters of the alphabet; learn to spell common exception words; add prefixes and suffixes

WRITING: Grammar, Vocabulary and Punctuation -

Joining words and clauses with 'and', capital letters, full stops, question marks and exclamation marks **Composition:** sequence sentences to form short narratives

HANDWRITING – letter formation; form capital letters

Years 1 and 2

Spoken language: listen and respond appropriately to adults and their peers; ask relevant questions to extend their understanding and knowledge

Suggested books:

Woodpeckers book based curriculum will focus on traditional tales from other cultures, such as *Amazing Grace*, *Handa's Surprise* and *Dear Primo*. Any versions or collections of tales from other cultures that you may have at home would be much appreciated.

<u>Maths - Plan opportunities</u> within current scheme of work for children to develop their data handling abilities, problem solving and knowledge of 3D shapes.





Topic Information

Maths

Year 1:

Number and Place Value - count to and across 100, forwards and backwards, begin with 0 or 1, or from any given number; read and write numbers from 1 to 20 in numerals and words; given a number, identify one more and one less.

Number—Addition and Subtraction - represent and use number bonds within 20; solve one step problems that involve addition.

Geometry - properties of shapes - recognise and name common 2-D and 3-D shapes.

Year 2:


Number and Place Value - recognise the place value of each digit in a two digit number (tens, ones); identify, represent and estimate numbers using different representations, including the number-line.

Addition and Subtraction - solve problems with addition and subtraction; recall and use addition and subtraction facts to 20 fluently, and derive and use related facts up to 100; recognise and use the inverse relationship between addition and subtraction.

Geometry—properties of shapes - identify and describe the properties of 2-D shapes, including the number of sides and line symmetry in a vertical line.

Statistics - interpret and construct simple pictograms, tally charts, block diagrams and simple tables.





class Information

Please note the following information to ensure that the school day runs as smoothly:

- Spellings tests will take place on Monday mornings. Please help your child to
 practise their spellings as it really does make a difference. There are spellings apps
 which can help with this if required.
- We have an allocated reading time most days, so please ensure your child's book and reading record are always in their bag. Please aim to read every evening for ten minutes and sign the Reading Record. Friday golden time is a reward for children who read three times or more at home. Year 1 children may have key words to learn, so please help your child to learn these; again they will be monitored on a weekly basis.
- Children's Forest School and PE kits should be in school at all times, with appropriate clothing for all weather. Woodpeckers take part in Forest School on Tuesday afternoons and PE on Monday and Thursday mornings. Kits will be sent home to wash during the holidays.
- Children need a water bottle in school every day, which will help to keep them
 hydrated as we continue with our daily mile.
